"GIVE ME THAT OLD TIME RELIGION!" ARE YOU SURE?

"Give Me That Old Time Religion" is a song that is often mistakenly called a Gospel Song and dates back to 1873. It has been revived and sung by various famous country singers, including Johnny Cash, throughout the 20th and into the early 21st centuries. Interestingly, the song is called a gospel song even though it does not mention God or Jesus in its lyrics. The phrase "Give Me That Old Time Religion" has become a common expression, often used when changes in liturgy, organization, or outreach are taking place.

The writings of Paul are the earliest in the New Testament. In his letters, we can observe the developing practices of the Christian communities. Later, the Gospels were written, possibly between 60 AD and 100 AD. These writings give us insight into the practices of worship and the way of life expected from a Christian as a member of the community.

By 120 AD, rules for Christians were established in *The Teachings of the Apostles*, also known as *The Didache*. Christians were expected to pray five different times throughout the day: in the morning, at noon (usually joining in corporate prayer at whichever home they were meeting in), in the later afternoon, at night, and at midnight. This practice gradually became more common over the early centuries of the church. Additionally, Christians were advised to pray the Lord's Prayer three times a day and to confess their sins to the group. These requirements, and others of the early church, lasted until the Reformation. Christians were to worship, pray, and fast on days other than in Lent. If you couldn't live up to the rules or behaved in a "non-Christian Way," the community dissolved its relationship with you and expelled you.

The Reformation brought changes in how Christians lived their daily lives among various groups, from Roman Catholic to Reformed, Lutheran, Anabaptist, and many others. These changes often continued some of the early requirements. Changes in the liturgy of worship occurred from the early New Testament Christians into this century.

Next time you hear someone say give me the old-time religion you will be able to explain that perhaps they didn't really want the "real" old-time religion. If you would like to learn more about the development of the Liturgy and why we use liturgy and what the different parts mean, you can join the Searchers Class 10 AM on Sunday mornings. By the time this article is published we will be into examining our liturgy.

his wife's death.

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
Having driven past Eastminster many times, Bill was interested in what programs were happening in our church. He went online and watched a service when Pastor Paul

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There are several options for you to grow in your personal faith here at Eastminster. We have three adult Sunday School classes. Two that meet every Sunday morning at the church and one that meets on Monday nights via zoom.

Wednesday Bible Study: Pastor Paul leads a study of the Gospel of Matthew called "Making Jesus My Teacher for Life." The class meets each Wednesday in the Conference Room at 10:30 a.m.

Navigator's Class: Taught by Blair and Cindy Garrett. The Navigator's class grows spiritually through a weekly study of the Bible at Eastminster. The class meets in Classroom #15 from 10-11 A.M. each Sunday, in person and via Zoom. We study one book at a time, usually we cover one chapter each week. The format is to read and discuss each passage as a class. As we study the Word, we are walking and communicating with God as He guides and directs us through the power of the Holy Spirit. We are called to discipleship by the Lord and through our studies, we gain the wisdom of God that gives us the ability to share our faith in Jesus Christ with confidence. Over the years we have studied the following Books of the Bible and other studies: Bible Studies include: Mark, Matthew, Luke, James, John, 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 and 2 Peter, Genesis, Job, Nehemiah, Daniel, Jeremiah, The Acts of the Apostles, Romans, Exodus, 1 and 2 Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, 1 and 2 Timothy, Hebrews and Ruth.

Searchers Class: Taught by Fred Watkins. The Searchers are currently exploring the history of Christian worship and examining the reasons behind its various components. Our objective is to gain a deeper understanding of how this knowledge can assist us in living as God's people. We discuss practical ways to incorporate what we learn into our lives. Our group is friendly and welcoming to young adults and seniors alike. We study a range of religious texts, including various books of the Bible. We meet every Sunday from 10-11 AM in the Conference Room.

Taught by Gleaner's Class: members of the class. The Gleaners use The Present Word Curriculum. This curriculum is divided into four series, Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer. The study is based on International Sunday School Lessons for Christian Teaching. We are currently in the Winter Series, which is entitled Faith that Pleases God. There are three units in this series: Profiles in Faith. Learning about Faith and The Righteous Live by Faith. If you have been a faithful member of a congregation for any length of time, you have probably sung *Praise God*

from Whom All Blessings Flow, #606 in our Presbyterian hymnal Glory to God. This hymn is often referred to as "the Doxology," even though there are many other doxologies. I grew up in an East Texas Southern Baptist Church, where the congregation sang this doxology every Sunday, as well as at church dinners and other occasions. It is the most commonly sung doxology in Western Christian Churches. The Eastern Orthodoxy sings others as well as this one sung to a different tune. I used to believe that the hymn dated back to the early churches of the 90s to 150s AD, but I now realize that this impression was incorrect.

Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow is a hymn written by Thomas Ken (1637-1711), who was a bishop in the Church of England. Ken became an Anglican priest in 1662 and served as a rector in several parishes. He also worked as a chaplain to Princess Mary of Orange between 1679 and 1680 and later became chaplain to King Charles in 1683. In 1685, he was appointed Bishop of Bath and Wells. Throughout his life, he was involved with the royals.

In 1687, King James II imprisoned Ken in the Tower of London, as he refused to sign the Declaration of Indulgence. He did not want to promote King James II's Catholic faith. However, he was later acquitted of the charge. When King William III ascended to the throne, Ken refused to swear loyalty to him and resigned from his office. He spent the rest of his life in the home of Lord Weymouth, at Longleat, Wilshire.

The date that Thoms Ken wrote the text for *Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow* is unknown. The first mention of the text is in 1674 as the final stanza of two longer hymns, *Awake, My Soul and with the Sun* and *Glory to Thee, My God, this Night*. It was later wedded to the tune from the Genevan Psalter 1531. This tune is widely used in most congregations.

In our *Glory to God* hymnal, this text is set to four tunes. We use two of them, #606 and #607. #607 is the music as it is used in the Genevan Psalter. #606 is the quicker version of the two. We use a variety of responses after the offering, even verses from hymns. On Communion Sundays, I always try to use #606.

#606 is great to sing at home or other places, to give thanks for grace before meals and other occasions since the Bible urges us to praise God all the time.





What is One Great Hour of Sharing?

The One Great Hour of Sharing Offering, received during Lent, has a seventy-eight year history as an ecumenical endeavor that now involves nine denominations and Church World Service. Founded in 1946 by Episcopal Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill, a goal was set to raise one million dollars in one hour for World Relief.

Today, projects supported by One Great Hour of Sharing are under way in more than 100 countries, including the United States and Canada. In recent years Presbyterians have given about \$10 million annually.

Currently, the allocations used were determined by the 202nd General Assembly (1990):

- 32% to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance
- 32% to Self-Development of People
- 36% to the Presbyterian Hunger Program

Eastminster's One Great Hour of Sharing receipts will be evenly divided between Camp Gilmont and the denomination.

There are many opportunities and different ways to contribute to One Great Hour of Sharing. Included with this newsletter is a One Great Hour of Sharing Calendar with interesting ways to begin your contribution. Truly, the calendar explains not only the needs but the daily reminders of just how blessed that we are.

The Offering will be received March 17, March 24, and March 31 Easter Sunday.

Best of all, the choir raised over \$1200 to go toward guest musicians in the coming year. Thank you to ALL who joined us for good food and fun.





Be the donkey

Corrie ten Boom, a devout Christian who helped shelter hundreds of Jewish people from Nazis during World War II, was asked

how she stayed humble despite her fame.

"When Jesus rode into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday on the back of a donkey,



and everyone was waving palm branches and throwing garments onto the road and singing praises, do you think that for one moment it ever entered the head of that donkey that any of that was for him?" she replied. "If I can be the donkey on which Jesus Christ rides in his glory, I give him all the praise and all the honor."

Jesus told his followers they'd need to carry (or "take up") their cross. But how well do you carry your Savior? How do you bring him into a world that desperately needs the good news of the gospel?

Resurrection rumblings

In *Easter Earthquake*, James A. Harnish explores the "earthshaking promise" of Jesus' resurrection. Easter Sunday "shatters the power of fear," he writes. "Because Christ is risen, we no longer allow fear to dominate, control or manipulate us. We don't remain imprisoned in the tombs of our past failures or buried under the weight of present anxiety. In the risen Christ, old things pass away and everything becomes new."

Easter, Harnish adds, is proof that God hasn't forsaken us and is present among us.

"The Resurrection contradicts the assumption that Christ resides on an ethereal cloud in a distant heaven. Rather, we find him on the dusty road that leads to the real stuff of our ordinary world."

Jesus' followers can find him everywhere, Harnish concludes. "The risen Christ will meet us along the confused, chaotic, fearful paths of our lives and speak the same words the women hear at the tomb, 'Do not be afraid."

Transformed

Before becoming a Christian late in life, British journalist Malcolm Muggeridge denied that Jesus was God's Son and had risen from the dead. If Jesus' body was missing, he said, someone probably snatched it and abandoned it to the vultures, leaving the bones to whiten in the sun.

For Muggeridge, the turning point was encountering a living Lord. "If you should ask me by what authority I talk about the power of Christ to change human nature, I should reply to you simply ... because he has changed me," Muggeridge said after discarding agnosticism. "I can look anybody in the face today — my friends, my colleagues and what, perhaps, is most difficult of all, the members of my family — and be sure that they know, as I know, that I am really and literally a new creature in Christ Jesus since the day when he came into my life."




