SLEEPING MATS

If you have not seen or heard of these incredibly creative and effective sleeping mats made from plastic bags, just google and see the possibilities. Made from plastic bags, these mats make the most of recycling. They help those who use them remain cooler in the summer, warmer in the winter and drier during the rain.

Jennifer Gailey has graciously volunteered to demonstrate the cutting process, the tying and the making of “plarn,” known as plastic yarn. We will have stations set up in the Fellowship Hall for participants at all stages of this process. You’ll be hearing more to help you decide which station sounds the most fun for you! And, if you happen to be a crocheter, have we got some fun for you! Meet with Jennifer Gaily on Saturday, July 21 from 10-10:30 a.m. for some instruction on turning the plarn into a comfortable sleep mat.

What do we need from you:? All the plastic bags you can gather between now and July 29. They can be any color, size, design...the more colors, the brighter the mat.

Also, it would be helpful if you could bring your own scissors.

Keeping in mind the heat and time, we intend these to be projects that are fast, easy and doable in a short period of time following lunch. Speaking of lunch, it will provided this Sunday. Join us for a taco/salad bar!

THE BAG LADIES

A group of women in Tennessee found a way to help people in need, and the environment, at the same time. They call themselves, "the bag ladies."

They are taking old plastic bags and turning them into mats for the homeless to sleep on. Some mats were even sent to Louisiana to help people who lost their homes to flooding.

"It's addictive. It gets to the point that you do two or three and you say, 'Hey, I'm actually making a difference in someone's life,' and you want to do more," said Janice Akin.

It all starts with cutting plastic bags into strips, tying those strips together, and rolling them into a ball. The Bag Ladies call it "plarn," instead of yarn. They then crochet the "plarn" into mats.

"This is not young ladies doing this. This is older ladies with arthritis," said Akin. The group of "bag ladies" has doubled in size since they met for the first time less than two years ago.

What to Pray for?

Through this prayer guide, you will have an opportunity to petition God on behalf of our leaders and those who are in authority over us, and to pray for our families, our communities, and pray for unity in our country. Why Pray?

Notes From Fred

Another Sanctuary choir year has ended with the June 24th service. Huge thanks goes to the members of the choir, instrumentalists: Melody, Bill, Sean, Tim and Bruce, those members who did solos and ensembles, the spouses, families, or significant others for supporting all in faithful attendance to rehearsals and leadership in worship services.

By the time you receive this newsletter, we will be into July services and the Summer choir will be leading in the services. All are welcome to join with us at 10:44 ½ to prepare a hymn, praise song, or spiritual for that day's worship service. Some Summer Choir members go down to sit with family after the anthem and during the Sermon Hymn. Some family members sit in the loft for the service. It's your choice. Join us to lead in worship. Come once and give it a try and if you are gone for a Sunday or more its ok, just come back and sing with us again.

Over the course of the year I get questions concerning various things dealing with the worship service.

I'm going to answer a few of them in this newsletter and if you have questions I don't answer, email or speak to me at church and I'll do another column of these in the near future.

WHY DOES THE CHOIR PROCESS? In Reformed worship (Presbyterians are in the reformed tradition and continually reforming as we believe God is still speaking to us), we believe the choir represents the congregation and symbolizes the congregation following the cross to remind us that it is God who initiates and leads us to the place of worship and in the recessional, leads us back into the world to follow wherever God leads. So the whole processional has an important symbolic representation and could be done with as few as one choir member in their robe representing us all.

WHY ISN'T THE CHOIR UPFRONT IN THE CHANCEL FOR THE SERVICE? We believe, since the choir represents the congregation to God during worship through prayers, hymns, songs of praises, and scriptures, that they are not performing for the congregation, but are representatives of the congregation to God. The choir, by being in the loft/back of the congregation are less of a visual distraction during these times of song and through out the whole service. We are left then to meditate on the elements in the chancel such as the Cross, the

Communion Table, the scriptures, and the sermon. As much as is humanly possible it helps to take away the idea of the choir performing for the congregation instead of their offering on behalf of the congregation to God.

WHY IS THE CHOIR CALLED THE SANCUTARY CHOIR AND NOT THE CHANCEL CHOIR LIKE SOME CHURCHES? Our choir sings from the back of the congregation, as do some choirs in other congregations, whether in a loft or same floor level as the congregation so these are choirs that are in the sanctuary. Choirs that are called Chancel choirs are those sitting in the chancel either facing the congregation or on one side of the chancel or on both sides.

WHY DOES THE CHOIR WEAR ROBES? It is a symbol of their office in the worship service, like the robes worn by the Minister and Liturgist, they also help to remind us we are in God's house, and not in the world. Suits and dresses can sometimes be distracting to our eyes and mind, keeping us from meditating on the words of the Scriptures, the Sermon, and the music.

OK THEN WHY DOESN'T THE CHOIR WEAR THEM ALL THE TIME. Many churches wear them year-round. Here we do not ordinarily wear them in July, most of August, and in Sept until the choir is commissioned once again to their office of service. Part of that is during that time traditionally the choir has not joined the processional of the Cross as we have not had a choir. We used to use only soloists, duets and ensembles so there was no choir, however a few years ago we felt we needed a choir to lead in worship during those months so we formed the Summer Choir and some of those are congregation members who by their own admission would have a problem singing and walking. (smile)

There is also a human consideration, it can get very hot in the loft in July and August, and as far as that goes anywhere in the sanctuary so much so that sometimes in those months the Minister and Liturgist forego their robes of office.

There have been several quotes about Texas heat compared to hell, etc. I like this one: "I know I'm saved and going to heaven, 'cause I believe in Jesus and I've been living in hell in Texas."

Being Good Stewards of God's Time





Synod Youth Workshop





The next time you read or hear a New Testament letter, imagine a time when such communication was rare and precious. Hear the writer's words — which are also God's words to you — from that perspective, and hold them fast.

FOOD FOR THE SOUL

A shout out to several “cooks” who have already provided a variety of meal dishes that can be frozen and given to our homebound members as visitation teams drop by for a “hello” and “how are you?” Thank you: Vicki Thiebaud, Vicki Cook, Christine Blair, Sherry Holloman, Philis Knox, Denise Bennett and Bobbe Brown. And, thanks to others who have committed to providing food at a later date.



Quite simply, this united effort helps the members of the Congregational Care Committee provide good, healthy meals to our homebound members from time to time or as needed. As our congregation is growing older...and wiser...this little extra “help” makes the load lighter for all.

Here’s an example of what has been prepared in containers that will easily feed one or two: Meat loaf, breakfast casserole, vegetable beef soup, roast, zucchini bread, broccoli cheese casserole, poppy seed chicken, fried chicken, ginger snap cookies and small pies.

The wonderful thing about this, it is food for the soul for the giver and the receiver!

IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO HELP, HERE’S HOW: Prepare any meat, veggie or dessert dish that is easily freezable. Let Christine, Kathy or Sherry know what and when you are preparing. On any Sunday, we will send home with you plastic, freezable containers into which you can place your cooked food. We will have a short size for meats, vegetable and desserts, and a taller size for soups and stews.



Take the containers home with you. Fill them and return them to the church. Again, letting Christine, Kathy or Sherry know that you have returned them to the church. This communication from start to finish allows the members of the Congregational Care Committee to know what foods are available for our homebound at any given time.
