The picture below features me and a statue of John Knox taken at the St. Giles Cathedral in Edinburgh, Scotland (UK). John Knox facilitated the Protestant Reformation in Scotland. In Knox's perspective, one of the keys to reformation was Biblical literacy and education in general. He lobbied to make education free for Scotland. How can you read the Bible if you can't read?



As you can see in this picture to the left, John Knox and I are serious about learning the Bible.

Beginning October 4th I will lead a study on the Gospel of Matthew called "Making Jesus My Teacher for Life." We will meet on Wednesdays at 10:30 am in the Session/Conference Room. Matthew contains more teachings of Jesus than any of the other Gospels—one such teaching is the Sermon on the Mount. If we are going to follow Jesus, we need to know his teachings.

Something you should know about they way I lead a Bible study is that we will always be focused on concrete application of the scripture. As Presbyterians we love to gain knowledge of the Bible and just about anything having to do with truth. However, this will not be an academic study of Matthew. It will be a practical study. We will learn how to live the teaching of Jesus. We will have rich discussion not just about the scripture, but about our own personal walk with Jesus. Think of me as less of a teacher and more as your coach. No pushups or laps! But, there will be some challenging assignments to take with you.

Our purpose will be to grow in our discipleship and relationship with Jesus, the Father, and the Holy Spirit. I hope so many of you will join me that we have to abandon the Session/Conference Room and move to the Fellowship Hall!

John Knox and I will be eagerly awaiting your participation!

"Making Jesus My Teacher for Life." Weekly Bible Study beginning Wednesday, October 4th at 10:30

Reformation Sunday is on October 31st. We will once

again sing the great hymn of the Reformation: A Mighty Fortress Is Our God. This is hymn 275 in the Glory to God Hymnal. It is the best-known hymn of a large body of congregational hymns that Martin Luther wrote and his most ecumenical.

You may have heard Luther's story. There are many biographies and films of the Roman Catholic monk and some highlights of his life. During his studies, he came to believe that the Church of Rome was corrupt. On October 31, 1517, he posted his now famous 95 theses on the door of the Wittenberg Church hoping to stimulate some debate. In 1521, Luther broke with Rome and refused to retract his writings before the Diet of Worms (a kind of Catholic Court). Soon after, Luther was recognized as the leader of the German Reformation.

Luther was blessed with several skills: writer, translator, preacher, and amateur musician. His thirty-seven hymns stand alongside his theological writings and his translation of the Bible into German as testaments to his creativity and intellectual ability.

United Methodist Hymnal editor Carlton R. Young summarizes well Luther's contribution to hymnody: he "wrote several original hymns and melodies, revised many Latin hymns to German texts set to adaptations of plainsong and folk melodies, and encouraged the composition of new texts and rhythmic hymn melodies. His thirty-seven hymns and paraphrases are cast in simple, plain, and sometimes rough phrases and striking metaphors, qualities that are for the most part lost in English translations." One Hundred English-language versions of Luther's hymns

exist. In 1853 an American Unitarian minister, Frederick Henry Hedge (1805-1890) made the translation that appears in most modern hymnals. The German version of the hymn is a metrical paraphrase of Psalm 46 and contains some embedded Christological images.

Finally, we get to the popular notion among many who state that Luther (and John and Samuel Wesley) went into bars to find congregational tunes. Yes, Luther, John Wesley, and Samuel Wesley composed or used musical settings that were the musical styles of their day. Yes, Luther liked his beer, but the original music for *A Mighty Fortress* is in a Renaissance folk style.

It is a much livelier version of the tune Ein Feste Burg. I once used it with the youth choir at FPC Dallas and the congregation loved it. Perhaps sometime we may try it here. Most likely the reason people associated the tune as a bar tune is Luther's use of a music format called "Bar Form" (AAB) so with Luther's admitted attendance to some bars of his time it is easy to see where the idea that Luther used a bar song from one of his favorite hangout spots. So, no it is not a bar tune.

It is my hope that you will take a few moments to read the text and understand the references so that we sing with knowledge as we praise God.


Fall is in the air. Yahoo! The Eastminster Workday will be Saturday, October 7th from 10 am-1:00 pm. Please come and help.

- Replaced burned out bulbs in hallway.
- Replaced a capacitor for the condensing unit serving the toddler room.
- Replaced one sprinkler head and repaired a leaky valve in the sprinkler system.
- Plan to add 3 security lights to the west parking lot between the kitchen and the office windows. Cost is \$875.00. Waiting for cooler weather to do this installation.
- Treated the sanctuary sewer drain line with root killer.

Fall Workday is October 7th from 10 am-1:00 pm:

- Clean the lenses on the lights;
- Clean out attic area above the kitchen;
- Organize maintenance closet;
- Caulk and paint circular window above kitchen in the attic;



- Add gutter guards; and
- Deep clean the sanctuary.

You can help! Pick up trash that you see in and around the building. Turn off lights if you know you are the last to leave a room. Let the House and Property Committee know if you see something that doesn't look right or is not working properly. Let's all share in the stewardship of God's house.

I'm not a big reader, that's more my husband's realm, but there is one book that I have read that has really stuck with me: William Young's *The Shack*. In the novel the main character has a conversation with God after the loss of his daughter.

Of course, that is a VERY brief summary, but there is a quote from *The Shack* that stood out to me and

that I think best encompasses not only my career as a diver, but the way in which I choose to live my life. It says,

"If anything matters then everything matters. Because you are important, everything you do is important. Every time you forgive, the universe changes: every time you reach out and touch a heart or a life, the world changes: with every kindness and service seen or unseen, my purposes are accomplished and nothing will ever be the same again."

There are many people who have supported me along my journey from learning to dive to coaching others how to dive, from student to teacher, both in my athletic and personal life, all of these people have shaped me and embodied how true this idea is. Everything you do has the ability to affect those around you whether you always realize it or not.

My oldest brother Raymond who always took an interest in my diving.

And my sister Mary Beth and her husband Lyle who are here tonight to celebrate this achievement.

To my children Alex, Daniel, and Lilly as well as Alex's husband Ellis and Daniel's wife Mary Kate and to my first grandchild who was born just this June. My kids have been immersed in the diving and swimming world since before they were born, and I can't wait to eventually share my passion for the water with my granddaughter.

And of course, I cannot forget my husband Tom. He swam for SMU while I was diving, so some would say we were destined to be together.

Tom, you are my rock and the one person who always believes in me, even when I don't believe in myself. Thank you for always supporting me, loving me, and believing in me.

My mentor, Jim Stillson, former SMU diving coach for 30 plus years. I never had the privilege of diving for you but I did have the privilege of standing next to you and learning how to teach and coach young divers from you.

Andy Serie who I coached in high school and who would go on to run our club team. I learned so much coaching alongside you as well, a role reversal I am glad happened.

Jim Montgomery, Olympic gold medal swimmer and his daughter Ellis Raymond. Thank you for giving me the opportunity now to teach young children how to be safe in and around water.

And last but never least, all the SMU swimmers, divers, coaches and parents here tonight to support not just me, but the SMU swimming and diving program past, present, and future.

Finally I must thank SMU. Thank you President Turner, Rick Hart and the selection committee for this honor. I was pleasantly surprised when I received a phone call from Rick and I am truly grateful for this recognition.

There were three schools that showed interest in me when I was looking at attending college.

One had a strong diving program, but I knew that the leadership was not a good fit for the diver I was and the diver I wanted to become.

The second was the naval academy which was flattering, but impossible seeing as only men were admitted to the academy at my time of enrollment. I guess they thought my name was Michael.

And the third was SMU. I am so glad I ended up at this institution, a place where I received a wonderful education and where I grew exponentially as a diver.

My quote at the beginning is mostly about people. And I truly believe people shape us.

I also believe that places can help shape us as well. They can serve as an inspiration, as a challenge, and as a place of well earned nostalgia.


To most of you here tonight, this is the Armstrong Fieldhouse, but for me and my teammates, we are standing (or sitting) on a place that has been integral to our lives. For many, many years, this was the very place where the Perkins natatorium and the AR Barr outdoor pool stood.

If I close my eyes I can still see where those pools would be, the one meter boards, the three meters, the outdoor platform and the old wooden stadium benches lining either side.

It was in that natatorium I trained while I was a student here at SMU.

It was also in that natatorium that I first began coaching diving, while my young children played on the stretching mats at the back of the pool. In the shallow end of that pool my children learned how to swim, and it was where I would bring my whole family to watch the swimmers

It's a Little Thing . . . That's Huge

It's something we take for granted: the ability to be clean when we leave the house. But for homeless students, it doesn't always happen easily. Frequent moves may mean some things get left behind or that your caretaker provided a bed but never thought about soap and deodorant. Laundromats are available, but sometimes laundry soap is outside the budget. It's a small, but critical detail that can get lost in the shuffle.

When Skyline's Community Liaison, Kenneth Hall, reached out to us in August to tell us his toiletries shelves were bare and to ask if we might supply some soap and deodorant for his homeless kids, Outreach jumped at the opportunity, assuming that we could provide perhaps a short-term solution to the problem.

We severely underestimated your generosity.

After one email – *just one email* – you came through with enough soap and deodorant to **FULLY**



STOCK the shelves at Skyline. Furthermore, there was enough to send a little bit down to Ann Richards Middle School as well. (They are just starting their own supply closet, and they had

nothing.)

Then he somewhat hesitantly asked about laundry soap. He was running low, he said, and some of his students were unable to get their clothes cleaned even once a week. His plan was to secure large tubs of soap that his student volunteers could divide into smaller bags that the kids could take home with them weekly. Again, the Lord – through you – provided enough (in donated monies that you had already given) to supply **580 LOADS** of laundry detergent.

The Liaison was overwhelmed by your donations (in a good way) and wanted to be sure that we knew not

only that they are grateful, but exactly what your gifts meant to students who often come to school ashamed of their hygiene. Kids who are self-conscious about those things, he explained, cannot focus their attention on learning because they're worried about their peers' reactions. The simple gift of being

clean – an action most of us give no thought to – is a blessing to a student



who worries about it.

Outreach does not know where God will take this partnership with Skyline High School, but ripple effects are already there. The good folks at St. Mark Presbyterian, after hearing about our project, are also donating toiletries from their supplies to the cause, and they are exploring ways to minister to the homeless students in their neighborhood. The teachers at Skyline are so impressed with the

response that they, too, are looking for ways to involve their churches in this kind of

Neighborhood Outreach.

God is Good all the time, and nowhere is that more evident than in your embrace of this small, but ultimately huge, mission. Michele, Continued from Page 7
