May 28 is Pentecost Sunday, and we will celebrate the birth of the Christian Church and Eastminster's birthday!

Pentecost's liturgical color is red. Red symbolizes the tongues of flame in which the Holy Spirit seemed to appear to the disciples and the people they preached to in the streets that day. Over 3000 believed!

So wear red to church this Sunday, May 28. We have 3 birthdays to celebrate, the birth of the Christian Church, Eastminster's birthday, and the day you chose to be a Christian.

The other day I was asked why I was a Presbyterian since I was raised an East Texas Southern Baptist, and yes, in those days they were a little different and distinctive from other Southern Baptists. I have been a Presbyterian for over 53 years. I have also been a Methodist and Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) member. I have sung for several Catholic and Episcopal Masses and Jewish services in Temples, Synagogues, and Congregations. I am a follower of Christ who died for us. I chose the Presbyterian Church because of how we govern ourselves. As with any system, it's not perfect but works well. Of the denominations where I have been a member, there are some theological differences between them, but they all have some things in common: belief in God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. So, it is this day that all Christians have the same basic core beliefs: that Jesus taught us to love our families, our friends, our neighbors, and the world. Jesus taught us to help others. When he helped people Jesus didn't ask them about their color, gender, or ethnic background, he just helped them.

I have been reading some stories told by Fred Craddock, a famous Disciples of Christ Pastor, Preacher and seminary professor, The following says what I'm trying to say to myself and to you better than I can. Dr. Craddock tells this story:

"Rear Admiral Thornton Miller came into my life in my younger years. I was a freshman at Johnson Bible College, and Rear Admiral Miller came and spoke in chapel and then talked to some of us boys after chapel. He was the highest-ranking chaplain in the military at the time. He looked great in that uniform. He had been at Normandy on June 6, 1944, D-Day and the day of the slaughter, and he described it that evening in the dorm to some of us, how he was going from soldier to soldier, screaming, crying, dying, trying to say a few words of comfort, have prayer, words of comfort, have a prayer and repeating the same over and over.

Someone asked, "Up and down the beach, with the shells going everywhere? Why did you do that?"

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His answer: "I'm a minister."

And the person began again, "But didn't you ask if they were Catholic, Protestant, or Jew? Did you just...I mean, if you're a minister..."

Now, get this. Rear Admiral Miller said, "If you're a minister, the only question you ask is, 'Can I help you?""

Jesus told us in John 14 our Gospel Lesson on May 14th, Mother's Day, "to love one another." 57 other times in John he says "love." At other times and ways, he tells us to help the poor, the children, and others.

Jesus didn't say "Only the minsters do this." He didn't ask about their color, ethnic background, gender, nationality, or belief. He just said "Help."

Lord, I pray you will keep us all aware of the opportunities to help someone with a deed, kind words, or a smile that we can be as the hymn says "...let others see Jesus in me."

Then free time. And here is where things went a bit awry for me. They offered a guided hike. My mind says, "Of course you can do this—you used to do it all the time." My body



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT COMMISSIONED PASTORS AND FRED

As most of you know, I have preached in our worship services from time to time over the years.

You also know that since my first Director of Music position in 1957, I have been preaching through the anthems, hymns, and songs that are used in the Worship service. I have, off and on since '57, preached. For two summers while in college I worked for the Texas Baptist Student Department leading in Youth-led Revivals. Over the years, I have served as full and part-time Director of Music and Arts, Director of Education, Youth Director, and Associate Minister in some very large and medium Methodist, Presbyterian, and Disciples of Christ churches. I was a licensed Minister in the Disciples of Christ church. God has opened many doors for me over the years teaching in High School, Middle School, and at UNT.

All those years since I was in high school, I have, off and on, heard this little voice that said you should do more. At first, I interpreted it to mean ministering through music and education and that is what I did but still, that voice sometimes was heard again. Last year it became louder.

Isabella and Michael were planning their wedding and asked me if I would marry them. My minster license would have allowed me to do so, however, I felt it was not valid since I was no longer in that denomination. Then Harry Meissner and I were talking, and he mentioned the Commissioned Pastor ("CP") program Presbyterian church started a few years back to help small churches to have a Pastor that couldn't afford a full-time minister. Then I represented our church at a Presbytery meeting and talked with Deirdre Maples who is a CP and serves a Church. She introduced me to another lady who was also one. Talked again with Harry about it and then with Sherry. All this time asking God if I was interpreting correctly. Shirlene, Harry, and Sherry suggested I proceed so the first step was to get the Session's approval which was given last October. Then I had to fill out a very long application form that required some deep thinking and self-examination. I finished it over a couple of weeks of work and prayer. Prevailed on Harry to look it over and

mailed it to the Presbytery the first part of December and waited and waited.

In the first part of April, I finally had the chair of the Subcommittee on CP's contact me and I interviewed with that committee. They were very positive. Usually, CP's must take 7-8 courses from Austin Seminary, but because of my work experience and Bible and other classes I had taken, they were going to recommend that I be exempt from that requirement. I then had to meet with the larger committee. After questioning, they welcomed me to the program and told me who my supervisor would be. I have attended the Lectionary discussion group twice monthly which includes CPs and some Ordained Ministers. I have a few more hoops to jump through and thus far things are going well.

What does all this mean? At this time, I have not been led to retire as Director of Music at Eastminster. It does mean that I can preach, of course, any Elder can do that if they wish, but this is more official. One is not a fully Commissioned Pastor until they receive a call from a Congregation. Then the Presbytery, as it does with Minsters, authorizes one to serve communion, baptize, marry, and bury members for that specific congregation.

I hope you will remember me in your prayers that God will continue to guide this calling.

Come ready to receive; then let that overflow fuel you for the days ahead. Come prepared to participate, knowing that worshiping together is a rehearsal for heaven. But most importantly? Just come.



Finding freedom

Juneteenth, America's newest federal holiday, marks the official end of slavery in the nation. President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863. Applying only to the states in the Confederacy, it declared "that all persons held as slaves are, and henceforward shall be free." But news of freedom didn't reach Galveston, Texas, until June 19, 1865, when 2,000 Union troops arrived to enforce the decree. The U.S. Constitution's 13th Amendment, which bans slavery, was ratified a few months later.

Just as freedom and justice came in fits and starts to the Israelites, so it comes to our own country and around the world, where the pursuit for justice continues.

Being good sports

When gestures of sportsmanship go viral, they often feature young athletes. In 2022, a Little League baseball player who took a pitch to the head later hugged the distraught opposing pitcher. Evangelist Ken Weliever says pro athletes, politicians, media personalities and everyday Americans should follow that example rather than focusing on revenge.

"Sadder still is when entire churches are disrupted by petty squabbles, partisan politics and overzealous opinions," he writes. "Relationships have been ruptured, marriages dissolved and families torn apart due to a harsh response to hurts instead of a spirit of forgiveness and an attitude of reconciliation."

Christians may sometimes feel tempted to seek payback, but Jesus calls us to live differently. "We

need to be reminded that we are to be a transformed people, not conformed to the attitudes and actions of this world (Romans 12:1-2)," says Weliever. "To be light in a world of darkness. And to be the pure, preserving salt in a society that's become corrupted and impure (Matthew 5:13-16)."

Divine dance

Using the fancy word perichoresis (from Greek for "around" and "contain") may win you admiring — or strange! — looks. But since the 7th century, people have used it as a beautiful image of the Persons of the Holy Trinity containing and permeating one another. A more familiar word, choreography, has led to recent understandings of perichoresis as the divine and eternal dance of love.

Picture three dancers' synchronized yet independent movements. Weaving gracefully in and out, each seems to know what the others will do next. They may touch lightly but don't constrain or impede one another. Though distinct individuals, they move so fluidly together that they are, in a sense, one entity.

Even more profound: Jesus invites us into the dance! "If you love me," he says, "you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth. ... I will come to you. ... I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you" (John 14:15-20, ESV). As the actions of Jesus, the Father and the Spirit interweave in Scripture and in the world, may our lives too be drawn into the loving dance.
